ENERGY

With issues such as climate change, carbon footprints the credit crunch and the increasing costs of energy dominating the media it seems a good time to consider how our community can reduce our energy costs and even generate some of our own energy. In Abriachan we are fortunate in having different options for our energy needs.

Wind

You may recall that AFT installed an anemometer at Rivoulich – wind speed data collected from the anemometer indicates that a wind turbine could provide a steady income for the community.

Wood

Recently, wood has become the fuel of choice with many people buying wood burning stoves and wood boilers. Would it be a sensible proposition to install a wood boiler in the village hall? Should the AFT expand the firewood business or should we think of other ways of utilising the wood in our forests?

Hydro

Although we do not always appreciate this very precious resource, Scotland is very well off for water and hydro power has always contributed significantly to our energy requirements. Abriachan once had a hydro generator on the Allt Killianan which had been built just after World War 2 to power greenhouses. Steve

Watson from Community Energy Scotland had a look at the installation which has fallen into disrepair and in his assessment it could be replaced with a generator which could produce enough energy to provide an income stream to fund a community project.

Community Energy Scotland will fund feasibility studies, consultancy and visits to established community energy installations as well as the setting up of a community organisation to manage and run the project. Within the next few months there is going to be a community information day in the village hall which will be a joint venture organised by all the community organisations in Abriachan. There will be representatives from Community Energy Scotland, Changeworks, Sustainability Officer, Highland Council, Highland Wellbeing Alliance and the Fire Brigade. This will give everyone the opportunity to explore all these options and to talk to the experts.

Bees and Gardening

Bees are dying in worringly large numbers, and no one knows for certain why. Last year, in the UK



alone, one in three hives was lost. It's a global problem that concerns us all; bees pollinate over a third of the food we eat. The cause of the hive losses is

The cause of the hive losses i uncertain, however there are many theories including:

- pests (such as varroa mites), viruses, bacteria and fungi
- pesticides such as neonicitinoids, which are picked up by bees as they pollinate sprayed crops
- genetic narrowing of the species through breeding of bees that are more docile and produce good honey yields, but are more susceptible to pests and disease

- lack of nutrition and loss of habitats related to urban sprawl and farming methods
- bad weather, including spells of particularly wet weather or sudden cold spells

How can we help bees? plant bee-friendly flowers

Comfrey, Common poppy, Corn chamomile, Corn marigold, Corncockle, Cornflower, Deadnettle, Devil's bit scabious, Field Woundwort, Foxglove, Goldenrod, Greater knapweed, Lungwort, Spiked speedwell, Teasel, Thistle, Viper's bugloss

allow a patch of grass to grow long and densely plant an area of your flowerbed to provide

bees with shelter from the rain or a sudden drop in temperature

- provide water for bees to drink this can be as simple as a shallow edged dish of water with pebbles in it to help bees climb in and out
- reduce the use of pesticides
